With very little oblation exposition, Eliot sets the scene in the passage exporting via her concise use of detail. The scene enters in medias res, with the covers holding hands, and Raymond blushing. While these details may initially seem tine, they offer excellent insight into the nature of the relationship. By the hands, the reader can deduce that these newly weds are, as should be expected, in lore. Yet the blushing response and following grvistion shows That there is not a lot of Transparency in the relatunship. Rather, it is a chess game of discreet, manipulative mares to disarm the other of control in the relations. $p$.

Even in the next action, after Lydgate says "No," this manipulation is emphasized. Not only toes Rosamond blatantly disobey her husband by exclaiming "then I must till him!" but she also undermines his authority covertly. "moving "two yards distance from him." By including the detail of distance, Eliot emphasizes that this was nut an emotunal outburst, but rather a calculated manewer to thwart her hus band. If

her intention was to subvert, she succeeded. Later in the passage, the namutor exposes that hew moving away "made everything harder to say." These little details expose the deliberation of the couple In one of Their first arguementr.

Details also serve to eeg ho the "financial difficulties" the couple confront, and show them to be less severe tran expected. Perhaps The most telling portion of the passage is the description of nat Dover, The appraises, will do to earn to Lydyates some more money. He will "take a good deal of the plate back againjand any of the jewelry we like." This choice detail shows that this couple is not broke, but rather has a "good deal" of plate sitter and enough geveiry to choose which ones to sell! By showing the couple to be $\frac{\text { only slightly financially distressed. Eliot allows the reader to }}{\text { his }}$ focus on the true issue of the passage - Who will get his way.

Another tactic Eliot employs to expose the pettiness of the argue rent is perspective. The narrator is Jrd-person omnicient allowing for an unbiased peek into the thoughts and desires of each character. This serves the reader well by allowing him to see the. motives behind each characters actions. This narrator shows the double fault at Lydgate's offending Rosamund, -moth the man's insensitivity and the difficult situation Rosamoridy placed him in with her disobedience. It also exposes the selfishness of Rosamond, only wanting to Find in her manage "more indulgence, more exactly to her taste." Halso shows how she aims to take advantage of Lydgates momentary humility to "attend to her own opinicus". By showing the flaws behind the
reserved argument, Elects narrator fillows the reader to see both sides of conflict.
As all unbiased narrators must, Eliot does not solely impleate Rosamond in this passage, she also contazes lydariont for his pride. sine first directly addresses it, selying that Lyamont's "proud resistance to humiliating arcumstances" hindered him from being sympathetic to his wife' 6 plight. Later, when Lydgate momentanly how r under his wife yoke, his pride quickly rebounds when offended, with $h_{y}$ "peremptoriness nosing again." This same pride That refused to ask his wife's farmer for money will not ask his trends on Family for help. the claims that she "doesn4 understand" his predicament and dismisses her as inferior, Yet he still wishes to be "gentle" and "imploring".

Ultimately, in thu passage Eliot offer a vanning to the early argument in marriage. She exposes, bs keen detail and omnicient point of view, that both hus band and wife have their own motes in tho mamage, Yet she does not condemn them. There is still love in their manage and one difficult time will lifelong not ruin a fetemn relationship. Yet she wars that unless this couple stop playing games and start being honest, squabbles will quickly escalate into fights

The use of fouls in worlds of literature is an inverelibly effective tool for characterization. In being presented with two antithetical personalities, the reader an learn and infer facts of one character's personality through the words and actions of another, Rosamond and Tertius Lydgate are such characters, and unfortunately for them selves, they are married tat Many details of both these characters and their relationship foin one another can be gleaned from the method in uriah the story was written. The narration offers deep insights into (not only) the words and actions of the two people but also a precise. examination of their motives and emotions.

The Lydgate's are rapidly discovering that they make an awful married couple, but both attempt to ignore this and maintain the charade of marital birrs, However by virtue of the amonscient third person narrator, the reader is allowed to see the under ly ing fee lings of the couple, and thus see right past the fulled charade, For instance, while it seems to Tortious that his wife is being quiet and attentive to his demands, in reality she 13 "Putin' partying' YEAH1!" "practising "quiet, steady disobedience" as a means of challenging him. This sort of misunderstanding deeply complicates their relationship, as Tertius then believes he is malory headway and pushes for more, which only causes Rosamond to resist hin n be even move stalwart in resisting him. Eventudly, This unabated pushing bey Jertfus prompts Rosamond to
make a secret confession to only herself and the reader: had she had the chance to choose again, she would not have married Lydgate. However, there is dramatic irony in this in that the reader knows that Rosamond has entirely given up on the marriage, while. Lydgate thinks he has wan after seeing that his wife is "determined to make no further resistance or suggestions" against him.

Though this revelation would surely come as a tremendous shock to Lyd gate should he ever lear of it, the reader had been steadily forewarned of it as a result of very specific details throughout the selection. The first such detail comes very early on, with Rosamond physically distancing hesse (f from her husband. To counter this, Lydgate calls her "Rosy", trying to make her feel childish and weak in a way that would make Thonald the ter (A Bill House, Hench Ibsen) prude. When Rosy cries, this too prompts an emotional response from Lydgate s who feels it paining his heart. He se two instances clearly demonstrate a major difference between them; Rosamond is quieter, preferring to speak through action, and much more conscious of the subtle meanings behind her husbands words, whereas Lydgate doesn't seem to listen to his wife, and responds only to her most obvious physical signals. There two divergent means of communication ane the basis of the rift growing between the couples Lydgate doesn't realize the effect that his demeaning and angry tone has on his

Even the "unpardonable" yell own of Lydgate seems to dive a wedge deeper between the two, making the marriage ever mo ne complicated. Wires's like "Self-blame" and "imploring". add a complesing io the relationship as one blames themselves or mistakes while tu other begs to be heard.

Eliot portrays tho characters almost prophetically io a modern reader of a smagquieg couple faced with financial difficulty due to previous choices. George Eliot in his novel "Mi.lolemaced", makes effective use of literary devices such as the oarrative perspective, in which the novel is written and also attention to detail e to characterize the relationship as husband and wife of lydgate and Rosamond.

Eliot protiays Rosamond as pampered and a bit selfish even. This con be seen in lines 23-25 where the narrator informs the reader, through Lydgate's therghty process that Rosamond had never drawn hardship only indulgence. In addition, the selection begins with Rosamond being too angry to speak because bydgote had not requested money fou her father. This sort- of attitude continues throughout the passage until the end when Rosamond realizes Lydgate is right, that she was throwing a tatum, and that she still loves hire. In contrast to Rosamond, Lydgate is portrayed as practical, pragmatic, proud, and wiser. The reader first sees his pride in the beginning when he is two proud to ask for money from Poremond's father, which he admits when trying to see the situation from her perspective, and later when Me refuses to ask his friends for favors. The reader also sees the practical side of Lydgate when, in lines 80-85, he wants to sell phteware and jewellery for mene, to help through their hardship. Throughout the selection the reader may observe Lydgate's circuit of contivally consoling Rosamund because he cares for her, and lapsing bact to his upsetting her again. This shows the compassionate side of Lydgate, proving that though they may disagree and become impacient with

one another they still love each other. Another way in which Eliot shows their relationship is through his careful attention to detail especially in regard to space. For instance, in limes 33-36 Rosamed's mooing away from Lydgate hurts hin as did her tears which "cut hin to the heart". Lydgate also asks forgiveness of Rosamond in lines 45-47 when she becomes onset with him.

Through these devices George Eliot develops and portrays the relationslip between Lydgate and Roramend as one of hardship dot ultimately love.

The chosen passage from the novel "middl emarch" by George Eliot demonstrates a feuding couple discussing financial matters. The author chooses to write in a narrative perspective, and uses imagery to show the ir struggle. From the beginning of the passacy, we can gather that Rosamond wants find the easy 4 way out of this problem by asking their parents for money, and until the end of the passage, both characters have clifferent solutions. And using the narrative perspective and imagery gives the reader insight into their situation.

Throughout the passage, the author uses certain details to show their concern and sadness. It is mentioned in lines 24-26 that Rosamond knows nothing more than indulgence, and their financial difficulties are not allowing it. Rosamond argues for her solution of borrowing money, and the details used in her actions show her frustration. Lydgate on the other hand, wants to stich it out and solve this on their own. Using the narrative perspective allows us to understand each sides of the arqumentand gives us their reasons for their actions. Without use of this chosen perspective, the reader would be limited in understanding, and the relationship would not be as easy to comprehend.

Furthermore, it is important for an author to use certain det ails, but a perspective used is even more so. Knowing the point of view can help the reader to
