In his foreword, Mauriac says that when he met him after the war Wiesel possessed "the gaze of a Lazarus risen from the dead yet still held captive in the somber regions into which he had strayed, stumbling over desecrated corpses. For him, Nietzsche's cry articulated an almost physical reality: God is dead" (xix-xx). To understand the young man Mauriac meets, we need to understand how he and his community change.
