<u>Coordinating Conjunctions</u> join two words, phrases, or clauses

for and nor but or yet so

<u>Ex</u>: She plays sports **and** excels at soccer.

She is a good student, **and** her favorite subject is history. Jack **and** Jill went to the store, **but** they forget to buy milk.

They are thoughtful **but** are also forgetful.

<u>Subordinating Conjunctions</u> introduce a dependent clause

after	if	though	although	as
unless	once	until	as if	in order that
since	when	because	so that	where
before	than	while	that	even though

Ex: Although the story was not long, it was dull and boring. Sweat ran down my face while I ran the marathon.

<u>Conjunctive Adverbs</u> introduce an independent clause

also	indeed	now	anyway	instead
otherwise	besides	likewise	similarly	certainly
meanwhile	still	finally	moreover	then
furthermore	namely	therefore	however	next
nevertheless	incidentally	thus	undoubtedly	

Ex: Some of these problems could occur at any company; however, many could happen only here.

I walked to the store. **Then**, I walked home.
